musical director

Benjamin Wolf

Benjamin Wolf works as a conductor, pianist, composer, singer and academic. He is Musical Director of the Zemel Choir, the Wallace Ensemble and the Royal Free Music Society, Choirmaster of Belsize Square Synagogue and a regular conductor of the Quorum Chamber Choir. Performances with the Zemel Choir have included Holocaust memorial services for the Mayor of London, concerts at the South Bank and St John's Smith Square, a broadcast for the BBC's Songs of Praise and tours to Europe, Israel and the USA. Activities with the Wallace Ensemble have included performances at the Queen Elizabeth Hall and Purcell Room, while the professional choir of Belsize Square Synagogue has been featured on documentaries for BBC radio and television. Recent performances have included Westminster Abbey's 'Service of Solemn Remembrance and Hope on the 75th Anniversary of Kristallnacht' and performances for the International Louis Lewandowski Festival in Berlin.

As composer, he has written music for the concert hall and the stage, including works using the texts and modes of Ancient Greek, a piano concerto and a cello concerto commissioned for the 70th anniversary of Belsize Square synagogue. He has written a number of pieces for the Zemel Choir and wrote new instrumental works for the Chichester Festival in 2013 and 2014. As pianist, he works as both accompanist and solo recitalist, while his singing is primarily focussed on performances with his own Jewish barbershop quartet, bOYbershop, for which he has written a number of arrangements and original compositions, including comic songs *The Only Jewish Cowgirl* and *Fifty Shades of Hay*.

Following the award of a PhD in 2010, he worked as a visiting lecturer at Royal Holloway and Senior Associate Teacher at Bristol University. In 2011 he was appointed as Lecturer in Music at Regent's University, London, where he teaches both academic courses and runs the newly formed choirs of the Regent's School of Drama, Film and Media. He has given conference papers in the UK and America, and was on the organising team for a conference at the IMR in January 2013 (focussing on music in twentieth-century Britain). He has also worked as a researcher on a Royal Holloway project investigating the use of music to accompany silent films.

soloists

Catharine Rogers (soprano)

Catharine studied music at the University of Durham, Performance at Trinity Laban, and completed the Opera Course at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland with performances as Fiordiligi, *Così fan Tutte* and Blanche, *les Dialogues des Carmélites*. Whilst a student at the RSAMD she was the subject of a documentary in a series on divas for the Open University. She studies privately with Robert Dean.

She has worked for companies and festivals including English National Opera, Scottish Opera, Festival d'Aix en Provence, Buxton Festival & Edinburgh International Festival. In the summer of 2013 she was invited to perform at the Coronation Festival at Buckingham Palace. Most recently she performed Sarah *Clemency* (MacMillan) for Highbury Opera Theatre & Donna Elvira *Don Giovanni* for Diva Opera on tour in the UK and France. Her next role is Alice Ford *Falstaff* for Fulham Opera.

Camilla Francesca Bull (mezzo-soprano)

A native of the Isle of Wight, Camilla studied singing at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in London. Since graduating, she has worked across the UK and Europe - music festivals in Ponte de Lima (Portugal) and Anghiari (Italy) and with UK companies; Opera at Home (Witch, Hansel and Gretel), Opera South East (Orpheus, Gluck's Orpheus), Scarlet Opera (Polinesso, Ariodante).

While on ENO's Operaworks 2011/2 programme, Camilla worked with Marcello Magni Complicité theatre, Christian Curnyn, John Berry and had performance opportunities on the ENO stage and venues such as National Portrait Gallery. She continues to study with Robert Dean.

She has appeared with Grange Park Opera in Eugene Onegin, Queen of Spades and I Puritani. Future plans include Cherubino, for Cambridge Operatic Society and creating the role of Nurse for the premiere of 'Clive' with Gestalt Arts.

Matthew Pochin (tenor)

Matthew began his singing career as a chorister at Hereford Cathedral where he later became a choral scholar and lay clerk. While a student at Cardiff University he also studied at the Welsh Collage of Music and Drama, where he played Hyllus in a production of Handel's *Hercules*. He continued his career on his return to Hereford, performing oratorios, recitals and several Gilbert and Sullivan operettas.

Matthew moved to South London in 2007 and, in addition to singing regularly at St. John's Wood Parish Church and Belsize Square Synagogue, he also sings at churches across the city, including St. Margaret's, Westminster, St. Columba's, Knightsbridge (Church of Scotland), St. Nicholas', Chiswick and St. Anne's, Highgate.

Benjamin Seifert (baritone - Elijah)

Benjamin Seifert (baritone) read Modern Languages at St Peter's College, Oxford. He then trained on ENO's The Knack and at the Royal Academy of Music. In 2004 he performed as a soloist in Orlando Gough's For the Public Good at ENO and has since sung at the Queen Elizabeth Hall, the Cadogan Hall, the Purcell Room and the Wigmore Hall.

He has worked with the Gilbert and Sullivan Opera Company at Buxton, British Youth Opera, Grange Park Opera, Opera Holland Park, Opera by Definition, Tête à Tête Opera and Arcola Opera. Operatic roles include Colas (Bastien & Bastienne), Zaretzsky (Eugene Onegin) Harlekin (Ariadne auf Naxos), Don Giovanni, the Count, (Le Nozze di Figaro), Bill Bobstay (HMS Pinafore), the Foreman (Trial by Jury) and Marcello (La Bohème) at the Soho Theatre, winning the Olivier Award for Best New Opera Production. He was recently seen as the Mayor in Pop Up Opera's *Docteur Miracle*, a short except of which was performed live on Radio 3's *In Tune*.

Oratorio work includes Messiah, Haydn's Nelson Mass, Rossini's *Petite Messe Solennelle*, Fauré's Requiem and the St Matthew Passion.

programme notes

This, Mendelssohn's second oratorio, tells the story of the biblical prophet Elijah. Elijah's story is told in the Books of Kings, though the text for this oratorio is compiled from many different biblical sources, including the Book of Lamentations, the books of Job and Jeremiah, and the Psalms of David. Elijah himself is one of the most significant prophetic figures in both the Jewish and Christian traditions, as he is believed to be the harbinger of the coming of the Messiah.

Mendelssohn's oratorio was begun in 1838, though he abandoned the project in 1839. It was revived when he received a commission from the Birmingham Festival committee in 1845, who desired Mendelssohn both to conduct at the 1846 festival and also to write a new oratorio. He revived the project and it received its first performance in Birmingham on the 26th of August 1846. Although the work began its existence as an oratorio in German, its first performance was in English, and its popularity proved far greater in England than in Germany. This popularity must have been in part a consequence of the importance of amateur choral singing in nineteenth-century England. It probably also reflected the prestigious position of oratorio and the importance of Christian observance in Victorian society. In *Elijah*, English choirs found a work that could take its place alongside the most prestigious of all oratorios - Handel's *Messiah*.

The story is set in biblical Israel, at a time when that country was divided into two kingdoms, Israel in the north and Judah in the south. Israel was governed by King Ahab, who was married to Jezebel. They encouraged the worship of the Canaanite god Baal, a religious practice that was considered idolatrous by Elijah, and which was blamed for a famine that afflicted the country. The first part of the oratorio tells the story of Elijah's confrontation with the prophets of Baal, his victory over them, and his bringing of rain to end the drought. It also describes Elijah as a worker of miracles, as he brings the son of the widow of Zarepath back to life. In the second part Elijah is forced to flee from a vengeful Jezebel, but returns in glory and is taken up to heaven in a fiery chariot. The oratorio concludes with quotations from the prophet Isaiah which look ahead to the coming of the Messiah.

A number of different characters are represented in the oratorio. Elijah is portrayed by the baritone soloist, while the tenor represents the character of Obadiah, a servant of Ahab who was also a follower of the true God, and also King Ahab himself. The soprano and alto soloists portray various characters including the widow of Zarepath and Queen Jezebel. The chorus, meanwhile, oscillate between support for Baal and support for Elijah, representing priests, Israelites, commentators on the story and even angels.

Introduction (Elijah)

As God the Lord of Israel liveth, before whom I stand; there shall not be dew nor rain these years, but according to my word.

Overture

1 The People (Chorus)

Help, Lord! Wilt thou quite destroy us? The harvest now is over, the summer days are gone, and yet no power cometh to help us! Will then the Lord be no more God in Zion? The deeps afford no water; and the rivers are exhausted! The suckling's tongue now cleaveth for thirst to his mouth: the infant children ask for bread, and there is no-one breaketh it to feed them!

2 Sopranos and the People (Duet and Chorus)

Lord, bow thine ear to our prayer! Zion spreadeth her hands for aid; and there is neither help nor comfort.

Ye people, rend your hearts, and not your garments, for your transgressions: even as Elijah hath sealed the heavens through the word of God, I therefore say to ye: forsake your idols, return to God: for he is slow to anger, and merciful, and kind and gracious, and repenteth him of the evil.

'If with all your hearts ye truly seek me, ye shall ever surely find me.' Thus saith our God. Oh! That I knew where I might find him, that I might even come before his presence!

5 The People (Chorus)

Yet doth the Lord see it not: he mocketh at us; his curse hath fallen down upon us; his wrath will pursue us till he destroy us! For he, the Lord our God, he is a jealous God; and he visiteth all the fathers' sins on the children to the third and the fourth generation of them that hate him. His mercies on thousands fall, fall on all them that love him, and keep his commandments.

6 An Angel (Recitative)

Elijah! Get thee hence; depart, and turn thee eastward: thither hide thee by Cherith's brook. There shalt thou drink its waters; and the Lord thy God hath commanded the ravens to feed thee there: so do according unto his word.

For he shall give his angels charge over thee; that they shall protect thee in all the ways thou goest; that their hands shall uphold and guide thee, lest thou dash thy foot against a stone.

Now Cherith's brook is dried up, Elijah, arise and depart, and get thee to Zarephath; thither abide: for the Lord hath commanded a widow woman there to sustain thee. And the barrel of meal shall not waste, neither shall the cruse of oil fail, until the day that the Lord sendeth rain upon the earth.

There is no breath left in him!

Elijah

Give me thy son. Turn unto her, O Lord my God; O turn in mercy, in mercy help this widow's son! For thou art gracious, and full of compassion, and plenteous in mercy and truth. Lord, my God, let the spirit of this child return, that he again may live!

Wilt thou show wonders to the dead? There is no breath in him!

Behold! God the Lord passed by! And a mighty wind rent the mountains around, brake in pieces the rocks, brake them before the Lord: but yet the Lord was not in the tempest. Behold! God the Lord passed by! And the sea was upheaved, and the earth was shaken: but yet the Lord was not in the earthquake. And after the earthquake there came a fire, the sea was upheaved, the earth was shaken: but yet the Lord was not in the fire. And after the fire

there came a still small voice; and in that still voice onward came the Lord.

For the mountains shall depart, and the hills be removed; but thy kindness shall not depart from me, neither shall the covenant of thy peace be removed.

Then did Elijah the prophet break forth like a fire; his words appeared like burning torches. Mighty kings by him were overthrown. He stood on the mount of Sinai, and heard the judgements of the future; and in Horeb, its vengeance. And when the Lord would take him away to heaven, lo! O come ev'ry one that thirsteth, O come to the waters: O come unto him! O hear, and your souls shall live for ever!

41 Chorus

And then shall your light break forth as the light of the morning breaketh; and your health shall speedily spring forth then; and the glory of the Lord ever shall reward you. Lord, our Creator, how excellent thy name is in all the nations! Thou fillest heaven with thy glory. Amen!

The Zemel Choir, established by Dudley Cohen in 1955, is proud of its international reputation as one of the world's finest mixed-voice Jewish choirs. We regularly perform in major venues throughout the U.K. and overseas, and, besides singing well-known favourites, are particularly proud to present new music, often specially commissioned, from contemporary composers. Recent highlights in the UK have included a Kristallnacht Commemoration service at Westminster Abbey, services for the Mayor of London, concerts at the South Bank Centre and St John's Smith Square, and the first European Jewish Choral Festival (2012).

We have travelled extensively to the U.S.A., Canada, Israel, and Eastern and Western Europe. Recent visits have included Belgium, France and Luxembourg (2007), Israel (2009), Paris and Strasbourg (2011), Berlin (2011), the USA and Canada (2013) and the Second European Jewish Choir Festival in Rome (2014). In November 2014 the choir will be performing at the Sacrées Journées de Strasbourg.

TV and Radio appearances have included the 1986 live television and radio broadcast of Kaddish for Terezin from Canterbury Cathedral, the Expressions of Reconciliation and Hope service in York Minster in 1990, a Holocaust Day commemoration edition of Radio 4's Sunday Worship in January 2001, and, in January 2005, an edition of BBC1's Songs of Praise, The Holocaust Remembered.

The choir is actively involved in educational work and support for Jewish charities. Our *Celebrate with Song* event, established in 2007, introduces new singers to Jewish Choral Music, and will next take place at JW3 in February 2015, while our most recent charitable concert was in aid of *Tzedek* (a charity which is involved in educational projects in Africa). In December 2014 we will be performing in support of the Alzheimer's Society. The choir also runs an annual workshop and joint concert with school children from the Goldbeaters and Orion Primary Schools in North West London. Through this work we introduce Jewish music to mixed-faith children and their families.

The Choir has maintained its reputation as a result of professional musical direction and a strong commitment to rehearsals by its members. We come together not only to sing, but also to be part of a warm and friendly social group. We are always happy to welcome new members.
